


GUHS/GHS All Class Reunion

Glendale High School, ca 1950




President's Message

The Board of Directors did not meet with city staff at the February 2, 2016 Board meeting to discuss the proposed Sahuaro Ranch Use Agreement. The meeting was rescheduled for March 1, 2016. During the same meeting the Board will meet with representatives of the **West Valley Historical Railroad Society** about where the Society can find a place for their model railroad layout. They have built a replica of the ice house, Santa Fe Depot, Beet Sugar Factory and other historic Glendale buildings.

The Railroad Society is asking for the GAHS Board input as to what historic buildings should they model and where could they locate their models and train equipment. It is a serious group of great craftsmen and enthusiasm for model train layouts. Some of their members have joined the Historical Society and will be volunteering to help with events. The Rose Garden rose bushes are sleeping now, but will wake up later this month and "Spring" forward with bright colors and beauty for visitors and weddings parties.

The Society has booked 40 weddings to date for the rose garden or adjacent palm tree area when the green area is being over seeded. Volunteers are needed to help facilitate the weddings. Mamie Smith's Memories of Glendale

Mamie Smith, wife of long-time Glendale educator Harold W. Smith, came to town by train from Kentucky in 1908. Glendale looked like the photo with dirt streets, horse mounted police and a town that didn't lock its doors. In 1985 Mamie, age 84, talked with Glendale Star reporter Donna Michaels about her memories of Glendale. Mamie said that from 1908 to 1985, "I think the main difference is the people, some people are so mean now". Back then "we would carry traffic."

our mattresses out on to the lawn and sleep peacefully all night", "Heck, during the depression when folks were losing everything they had, we didn't worry about crime." Mamie said she couldn't see Glendale becoming a real big city but was astounded by the new improvements such as the new city hall. She lamented that when her and Harold married in 1921 they should have bought the entire block where their property sits. They could have "cleaned up". Harold taught school and Mamie worked at Glendale State Bank. She went home for lunch one day and came back to find the bank had "gone broke" She turned to becoming a mother to Harold Jr, William and Deanna. Mamie was on the first girls Basketball Team at Glendale High School as the "jumping center". When she was in high school she and her short-hand teacher were asked to take notes for a big meeting to discuss the paving of Grand Avenue past Northern Avenue. She usually took the Phoenix street car to Phoenix for a round trip cost of 10 cents and in 1985 she didn't drive because of the "terrible traffic."

GENERAL JOHN J. "BLACKJACK" PERSHING VISITS GLENDALE

General Pershing, a huge WWI hero, came to Glendale by rail on Friday, January 30, 1920 arriving at 8:05 AM. Glendale was the first Arizona city to welcome the General.


Glendale Mayor C.H. Tinker and one of the largest crowds ever assembled in Glendale, including its elementary and high school students, who were given recess from school to meet Pershing at the Santa Fe Depot. W.J. Galbraith, head

of the Commercial Club introduced the General. Pershing gave a 10 minute speech talking about the necessity for broad education of children. He lauded Arizona's contribution of troops to WWI. However, Pershing explained "We cannot exist long with an illiterate people. A democracy conducted by ignorant fathers soon finds itself in the hands of ignorant and irresponsible people, and is soon drafted into anarchy. The safeguard of our


country today is the education of these little boys and girls in their duties as citizens. The state has no higher responsibility than to educate the children..."

When the Selective Service "Draft Act" was passed into law in 1917, the military found that 30% of those drafted were illiterate. General Pershing's trip by train continued on to Phoenix.

America was given a formal chance to thank General Pershing for victory.



A Family Remembers 'Old Glendale'

The Rayburns, Happy in Glendale

A few weeks ago the Society office received a wonderful letter from Evelyn and Albert "Bud" Rayburn sharing with the Society some precious memories of Glendale during difficult times for the Rayburn family. Bud is now 85 and Evelyn 78. However, in 1941 Bud's parents Prentis and Ida with sisters Rhonda, Vola, and himself, moved to Glendale from McAllister, OK thinking Ida had tuberculosis, which turned out to be false. They first lived in an auto court on East Van Buren and Dad took what jobs he could. Prentis got a job at Luke Field, but was electrocuted on the job in 1943. The family had an extremely difficult time to survive, but Roy Harrelson allowed them to live in the little well house on his farm with "Bud" taking care of horses at 12 and Rhonda doing waitress work at 14. The First Southern Baptist Church helped the family with food and clothing. Bud talks about

memories of he and sister Vola riding burros to the movies downtown Glendale. Ida, the mother, was not able to work, so both Bud 15 and sister Rhonda 17 quit school to support the family making money anyway they could. Bud even rode the bus to Phoenix to pick up a box of young chicks to raise and sell eggs. Jim Weed was an important mentor to Bud lending spiritual guidance and care for the family. The pastor and many others at the church helped the family. The family was able to move into the Glendale Housing Project. Bud joined the Army at 17, discharged in 1950 and recalled the same year to be sent to the Korean War. Sister Vola joined the Navy at 18 and now lives in Gilbert and Rhonda passed away in September 2013. Both sisters are life members of the Society. Bud and Evelyn live in Groom Creek, AZ.
