A quick glance at early Glendale history

For those new to Glendale history, here's a quick little primer, based on the research paper "From Crossroads to Metropolis," written in 1965. The Glendale Arizona Historical Society library maintains a research collection which includes books, newspaper articles, family histories, and documents available to the public to view by appointment.

B.A. Haskell established the town in 1892 for the Dunkard people, who were committed to temperance, and Glendale was known as a dry town. However, it's interesting to find out that some businessmen circumvented this prohibition by taking suitcases into Phoenix by trolley and bringing liquor back. When seven drunks were arrested in one day, suspicions arose around the bootleggers in the community. Seventy-five families originally bought acreage from the town. It was surrounded by fruit orchards and vineyards, and Glendale became a shipping point for grain, hay, stock, fruit, and dairy products.

Glendale was incorporated on June 18, 1910. The first Glendale council meeting was held on August 10, 1910. A.W. Bennett was the presiding mayor of a population of 1,000 citizens.

By 1930, the population was up to 3,200, and it was time to establish a city hall. By 1947, Glendale had hired a city manager. During its growth, the city leaders and citizens had established the fire department, churches, post office, sanitation department, women's club, library, grammar school, businesses, newspapers, and agriculture. Glendale appreciated a very diverse population including Russians, Hispanic, Native American, Filipino, Chinese, and Japanese residents.

Ostriches flock to Glendale in 1900s

In the early 1900s, ostrich plume hats were all the fashion rage for fine ladies. This created an opportunity for Arizona ranchers, including those in the Glendale area. According to Carol and Charles St. Clair in the book Images of America Glendale, (Charleston: Arcadia Publishing, 2006, pg. 40) an ostrich could produce one and a half pounds of feathers per year, over a time period of 20 years. A pound of feathers sold for \$75. In 1913, 8,000 ostriches were in Arizona.

A family is seen in a photo visiting a Glendale ostrich farm around 1915. After World War I, when ladies' fashions changed, the industry collapsed.

The ostrich diet featured alfalfa grown in Glendale, which created a unique luster to their feathers.

An ostrich could produce a crop of feathers every 8 months until it reached 50 or 60 years old. Plumes



are still used today in the making of costumes or for ceremonial purposes.
